4. Thirsk: home of James Herriot and much more

SUNDAY

11:01 catch the 128 from Kirkbymoorside Market Place (outside the Lemon Tree Café)

11:21 arrive in Helmsley Market Place

II:31 depart Helmsley Market Place (outside the coop) on Moorsbus M5 towards Thirsk

> The journey to Thirsk follows the edge of the Howardian Hills and climbs Beacon Hill where there are panoramic views of much of Ryedale. Yhe bus then goes through Ampleforth village and Wass before arriving at the spectacular Byland Abbey, once one of the most prestigious Cistercian monasteries in the country. A few minutes later finds the bus in the village of Coxwold, home to the writer Lawrence Sterne who lived at Shandy Hall (on the right hand side as the bus leaves the village).

12:09 arrive Thirsk Market Place

Thirsk has a great range of shops, cafes, pubs and everything else you might need. The 15th century church of St Mary is well worth seeing. Also in Kirkgate you'll find the World of James Herriot – the original home and surgery where the world's most famous vet lived, worked and wrote all those books based on his experience as the young vet.

15:44 leave Thirsk Market Place on Moorsbus M5 to Helmsley

16:22 arrive Helmsley Market Place

16:30 depart Helmsley Market Place (by the monument) on 128 to Kirkbymoorside

16:50 arrive Kirkbymoorside

Tranquil Rievaulx Abbey bustling Helmsley

SUNDAYS

11:01 catch the 128 bus from Kirkbymoorside (outside the Lemon Tree Café) **to Helmsley**

11:21 arrive in Helmsley Market Place

I I:27 catch Moorsbus M4 from Helmsley Market Place (by the monument) to Rievaulx Abbey

I 1:36 arrive at Rievaulx Abbey for a 2 hour visit

Rievaulx Abbey (English Heritage) is one of the most impressive monastic ruins in Britain. Founded in 1132, it became the most powerful Cistercian abbey in Britain. There is a café, shop, museum and toilets.

 \star You could walk back to Helmsley along the Cleveland Way (3 miles, about 1.5 hours) otherwise simply catch the M4 back, as below.

13:33 leave Rievaulx Abbey on Moorsbus M4 back to Helmsley.

13:42 arrive Helmsley (Market Place) for a visit of 2_{4}^{3} hours.

Helmsley boasts a wide range of shops, cafes, coffee bars and pubs, as well as a small brewery.

You can also enjoy the historic Helmsley Walled Garden, built in 1759 to provide fruit, vegetables and flowers for Duncombe Park. It has a café and toilets.

Helmsley Castle (English Heritage) dates back to 1120 and is a fascinating place to explore.

The National Centre for Birds of Prey is a 20 minute walk from the centre of Helmsley, set in the ancient woodland and rolling parkland of Duncombe Park.

16:30 leave Helmsley (Market Place) by the monument on the 128 bus to Kirkbymoorside

16:50 arrive Kirkbymoorside

2. Exploring Hutton le Hole & Danby Lodge National Park Centre

SUNDAYS

12:00 catch Moorsbus M3 from Kirkbymoorside (outside the antique shop) **to Hutton le Hole**

12:08 arrive at Hutton le Hole (opposite the Folk Museum)

Spend two and a half hours in delightful Hutton le Hole with its craft and souvenir shops, tea rooms, pub and toilets.

The award-winning Ryedale Folk Museum is an open-air museum with over 20 preserved buildings set in a 6 acre site. Come inside the Iron Age roundhouse, or the medieval manor house, and discover the fascinating story of life in the North York Moors. There's also an art gallery with changing exhibitions.

I 4:38 leave Hutton le Hole (opposite the Folk Museum) onMoorsbus M3 to Danby Lodge

The journey is an exhilarating ride high over the North York Moors with distant views of the sea and closer by, the renowned Lion Inn and Ralph Cross.

Along the way you'll pass Bronze Age burial mounds, remains of past industries, and lots of heather and sheep!

You arrive outside the National Park Centre at 15:10

Danby Lodge National Park Centre will keep you entertained with its 'Inspired by...' art gallery, exhibitions and shop. There's a café and toilets.

Outside there is a children's adventure play area and the Crow Wood trail. Danby is also the centre for a number of other walks such as to Danby Castle or back along the Esk Valley to Castleton. Free admission.

16:43 leave Danby Lodge on Moorsbus M6 back to Kirkbymoorside

17:25 arrive Kirkbymoorside

3. Circular moorland tour with 1¹₂ hours at Danby

SUNDAYS

12:00 catch Moorsbus M3 from Kirkbymoorside (outside the antique shop) **to Danby Lodge**

> The journey takes you to the picturesque village of Hutton le Hole and then an exhilarating ride high over the North York Moors with distant views of the sea and closer by, the renowned Lion Inn and Ralph Cross.

12:40 arrive outside the National Park Centre

Enjoy the exhibitions, art gallery, shop, café, Crow Wood trail, play areas, toilets. Free admission.

14:15 catch Moorsbus M3 to Guisborough

The bus climbs back onto the moors and arrives in Guisborough at 14:41. Stay on this bus (which becomes M4) as it goes on through Great Ayton and Stokesley, before heading for Great Broughton, Chop Gate and down through beautiful Bilsdale. The bus travels via the majestic ruins of Rievaulx Abbey and arrives in Helmsley Market Place at 15:57.

15:57 arrive in Helmsley Market Place

Time to stretch the legs or have a cuppa.

16:30 catch the 128 bus by the monument in Helmsley Market Place **back to Kirkbymoorside**

16:50 arrive Kirkbymoorside
